**Title:** War in Africa: making or breaking states?

**Content:** Violent conflict and civil wars in Africa have frequently been seen as either the cause or the consequence of state fragility. According to this way of thinking, many post-colonial states in Africa have 'failed' to hold on to their monopoly over the use of violence and thereby 'proven' the limits of their capacity to exercise power over society, as the upsurge in civil wars across the continent in the immediate post-Cold War era would indicate. In this seminar, we engage critically with such perspectives and ask instead how states in Africa, as elsewhere throughout the world, are (also) the product of (internal and inter-state) warfare. Civil wars, it will be argued, while being the cause of immense suffering on the part of civilian populations, do not simply destroy political orders, but also contribute to shaping and producing them.

**Learning objectives:** Students understand and reflect on the role of violent conflict and war in the history of state formation in Africa. They have knowledge of the most important theories of (civil) war, and are able to critically analyse and weigh the importance of factors such as colonialism, economic inequalities, ethnicity, Cold War dynamics, natural resources (scarcity and abundance) as causes of violent conflict.

**Content:** This course examines the relationship between gender, violent conflict, and peace processes. Students will read scholarship from a variety of disciplines — including but not limited to peace studies, feminist international relations theory, and gender studies — to assess the strengths and limitations of different theoretical and methodological approaches. The course will discuss the role of women in peacebuilding, and the importance, as well the limitations, of institutionalizing normative commitments to women's rights through "gender mainstreaming." However, this course strongly emphasizes that bringing a gender analysis to peacebuilding does not simply mean focusing on women; it also requires analyzing, for instance: the role of masculinity in disarmament, demobilization, and reintegration; the gendered political economies of war and peacebuilding; the militarization of femininity; the gendered dynamics of conflict related humanitarian intervention; and the role of feminist activism in peacebuilding.

**Title:** A world drifting apart: Is inequality the new poverty? – How does the shift from a perspective on poverty to inequality influence research and politics for sustainable development?

**Content:** The fact that eight men at the top of the scale own the same wealth as half of the world's population epitomizes the massive extent to which global inequality has risen. While poverty seems to have been reduced successfully, the divide between the haves and the have-nots diagnosed at the end of the Millennium Campaign is entrenched. The commitment to social justice laid out by the Millennium Agenda has been undermined in that specific "pockets of the poor" were systematically bypassed by its achievements, turning inequality into

one of our most urgent social problems. Evidence that in unequal societies the fight against poverty was hampered raised awareness on global inequality, as did insights on the detrimental effects of unequal societies to the wellbeing of all. Crises and risks that burden the poor disproportionately, out-distanced middle-classes in industrialised countries, persistent mass unemployment and highly informalised livelihoods in the global South contributed to what has been called the "inequality turn". Not least, appeals from scientists that the failure to effectively account for inequality will ultimately threaten our democracies propelled the debate on inequality, putting the issue firmly back on the agenda. In this course, we will

- a) inform students on the the recent historic development and the current global inequality situation
- b) highlight current inequality debates in the social sciences, namely in economics
3. address technical questions such as definitions of inequality, equity, equality, justice and issues of measurement and comparison of inequality situations.
4. discuss why inequity is important for sustainable development and what a turn from a policy to an inequality focus might imply, and
5. engage in the question as to how research can contribute towards policies, including discussing chances and risks implied in inequality oriented international cooperation and policy.
